



Funding opportunities to tackle air pollution in London

Below is a summary of some of the grants available to schools and community groups in London, who are looking for financial support to take action on air quality. The grants listed range from having very specific criteria (e.g., active travel) to more general criteria around supporting communities or young people; therefore, some may be more suited to your needs than others. Some of these are open to applications from schools directly whereas others have criteria that require working with a local authority or charitable organisation to complete the application.


An alternative avenue for securing funding for projects could be to approach local businesses with a view to securing sponsorship for your work. This is usually most successful when businesses have a better understanding of the impact air pollution has on children and the wider community, their responsibility to act to protect the rights of the child to a healthy environment and a clear summary of the benefits that your suggested intervention will have to address this. We have produced a <u>template letter</u> which articulates these arguments and that you can download and amend to your specific circumstances. Things to think about when approaching a funding application:


- Timing e.g. When do you need the money? How long is the application process? What documentation is required?
- Money e.g. How much money do you need? Is a grant the best way to get it?
- Aims of the project e.g. What you want to achieve? How do these aims meet the grant's criteria?
- How you will use the grant the specific needs of the project, the benefits it will have and how you will be able to document this
